

WORKSHOP SESSIONS

All workshops are scheduled for Thursdays from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.

January 7 & 14 - "The Idea Factory" with Conni Massing and Tracy Carroll Finding and fleshing out script and story ideas that will appeal to young audiences.

January 21 & 28 - "Making the Most of the Monkey Mind" with Beth Graham

Exploding your script and story ideas and transforming them into characters, monologues, and scenes.

February 4 & 11 - "Under Construction" with Stephen Heatley Script development from idea to full draft. (Note: Script development is akin to a playwright circle and runs in conjunction with the instructional workshops. Registration requires a commitment to participate in all "Under Construction" workshops while writing a script appropriate for young audiences.)

February 18 & 25 - "Characters Alive and Kicking" with Heather Inglis Fleshing out your characters with strong backstories and voice.

March 4 - "Under Construction" with Stephen Heatley

March 11 & 18 - "Writing Your Bones" with Josh Languedoc Finding and tapping into your own voice and story to reach young audiences.

March 25 - "Under Construction" with Stephen Heatley

April 1 & 8 - "Heavy by Mighty: Issue-Based Plays for Young People" with Dave Deveau

Creating issue-based plays for young people that are authentic and engaging.

April 15 & 22 - "The Well-Crafted Play" with Clem Martini Honing and polishing your script until it shines.

April 29 & May 6 - "Under Construction" with Stephen Heatley

Conni Massing is an award-winning writer working in theatre, film, and television. Stage credits include Night Shift (part of the This is YEG anthology) and The Invention of Romance (2014), both premiered by Workshop West Theatre. Her stage adaptations of W.O. Mitchell's Jake and the Kid (commissioned and premiered by Theatre Calgary) and Bruce Allen Powe's The Aberhart Summer have been widely produced. Conni is currently the regional writer in residence for the communities of Strathcona County, Fort Saskatchewan, and St. Albert.



Tracy Carroll has worked as Director, Dramaturge, Youth Theatre Programmers and Producer for many years in both Ontario and Alberta. She spent six years as the Artistic Associate for Alberta Playwrights' Network and was Artistic Associate at the Citadel Theatre where she co-created and directed KidsPlay @ the Citadel, a series of plays for children and their families. TYA Dramaturgy and/or Directing credits include: Shape of a Girl, Under Cover and the very popular Lig & Bittle at Concrete Theatre; Beneath the Ice by Eva Colmers; The Book of Ashes by Emil Sher at the Northern Alberta International Children's Festival; and The Sword in the Stone, A Giraffe in Paris, and Penelope vs the Aliens at the Citadel. Tracy has also dramaturged many times for Concrete Theatre's Sprouts Festival and Walterdale Theatre's Cradle to Stage.

Josh Languedoc is an Anishinaabe playwright, theatre creator, and educator currently living in Amiskwaciy Waskahigan (Edmonton) and is a proud member of Saugeen First Nation. For the past 2 years, Josh has been touring his acclaimed solo show Rocko and Nakota: Tales From the Land across Canada. Other projects include: The Eyes Of Spirits (Dreamspeakers), CIVIL BLOOD: A Treaty Story (Thou Art Here Theatre), Feast (Tiny Bear Jaws) and IN-COR-RI-GI-BLE: The Legend of Thundervoice (Blyth Festival). Josh is currently a masters candidate at the University of Alberta's MFA Theatre Practices program focusing on Indigenous playwriting and theatre creation methodology. Josh is also the Youth Education and Outreach Coordinator for Workshop West Playwrights Theatre.



Beth Graham is a playwright and actor. Her play The Gravitational Pull of Bernice Trimble was a finalist for the Governor General's Award and received the Gwen Pharis Literary Award. She is currently the Lee Playwright in Residence at the University of Alberta and the resident dramaturg at Workshop West Playwrights Theatre. Her play Pretty Goblins will be published this fall.



Stephen Heatley, B.A. (Brock), MFA (Alberta) is the Head of the Department of Theatre and Film at UBC and has worked in professional theatre for over 40 years. As Artistic Director of Edmonton's Theatre Network, he directed over 30 world premieres. His other credits in Alberta include the Citadel where he was Associate Artistic Director and the head of the Theatre School for 5 years, Stage Polaris, Free Will Players, Chinook Theatre, and Alberta Theatre Projects. Stephen has been involved with the Saskatchewan Playwrights' Centre's Spring Festival since 2000 as director and dramaturge.

As an award-winning writer, Dave Deveau investigates queer themes that speak to a broad audience. He is devoted to developing intelligent, theatrical plays for young people that foster conversation. His plays have been produced across North America and in Europe, including Out in the Open, tagged (Dora nomination) and Celestial Being (Jessie Nomination) for Green Thumb Theatre and Ladies and Gentlemen, Boys and Girls (Dora nomination) for Roseneath Theatre. He is currently working on commissions for Carousel Theatre for Young People and Nashville Children's Theatre. His plays for young people can be found in Scirocco's Fierce anthology and his first book called CISSY: Three Gender Plays, published by Talonbooks. www.davedeveau.com
